How New Technologies Could Help in Epilepsy Care, Education and Sensitization of Patients and Carers: The Experience of Telemedicine in the South of Morocco. Najib Kissani, et al. wrote a review about Authors showed through this work, that telemedicine offers various possibilities, to attach not only patients, families, physicians and other health professionals, but also associations. (Video conferencing; use of mobile phones; and also use websites and tutorials). This use of latest technologies is completed for free of charge, for all our patients with thesupport of university hospital of Marrakech. For a good category of illiterate patients in Morocco, we use audio and video messages to offer an opportunity of communication and exchange of all quite informations about the progress of their epilepsy and its follow up. Finally, we've a busy programme for specialists, GPs and every one health professionals to supply continuous training. From this experience, which can be reproduced in any low-income country, and regarding the benefits that we have been able to obtain from technology in the medical field, we should consider training other health professionals in different regions of Morocco to be able to develop the Moroccan experience in Telemedicine much more.

In a case report entitled Multiple Organ Involvements in a Case of IgG4 Related Disease. Samira Alesaeidi et al. has reported that A 64-year-old woman with presentation of proptosis referred to Rheumatologic clinic at

Amir-Alam hospital. The result of physical exam revealed that there was a left eve proptosis with 29 mm in size and no light perception. Computed tomography showed mass infiltration to left carotid sheet and mandibular foramen. Besides, there was an increase in hepatic vascularity and periportal infiltration predominantly in the left lobe that caused intra-hepatic duct dilation. Despite of the deterioration of the proptosis and visual acuity, probably due to limited knowledge about IgG4-RD, the patient did not receive the appropriate treatment. Unfortunately, this issue caused significant reduction in the visual acuity (no light perception). Finally, pathology and IHC study revealed presence of CD20+ plasma cell up to 60% per High power field and with the diagnosis of IgG4-RD, methylprednisolone and cyclophosphamide initiated and we observed a significant reduction of symptoms. And concluded in any patient with chronic tumor like lesions and pseudotumors without evidence of malignancy, we should think of IgG4 related disease. In this circumstance, biopsy may lead us to the definitive diagnosis. From this case, we learn that we should treat the patients with IgG4-RD in time, in order to avoid irreversible organ dysfunction.
