where photons are actually moving.

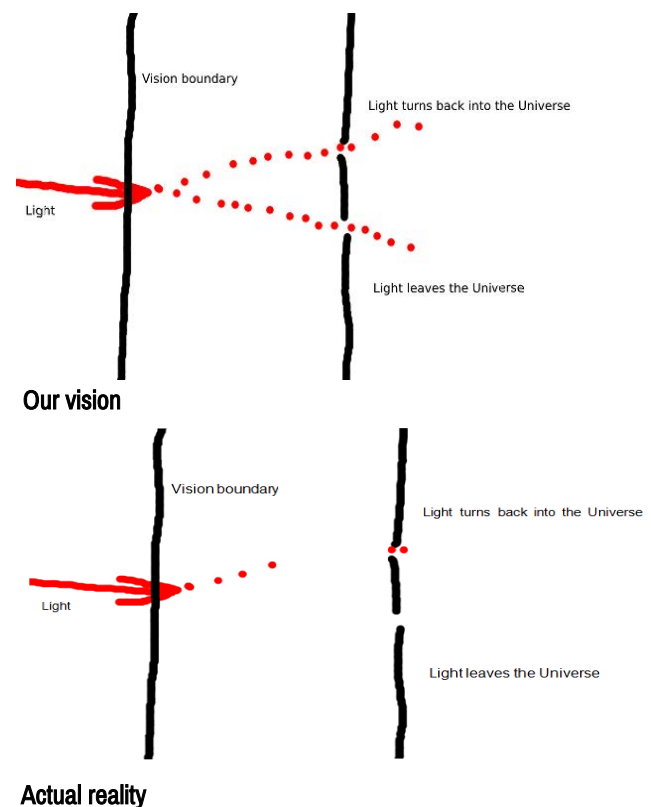
That is why it seems to us that light can leave the boundaries of the universe when it actually can't.
